Each year, Nicholas County Community Foundation awards several scholarships to individuals from around the county. In the last 6 years, NCCF has awarded over \$75,000 in scholarships to graduating high school students, as well as adult learners. The 2015 recipients were truly the top of their class in every way; high academic achievement, community servants, school leaders and exceptional athletes.

The Seelinger Foundation Entrepreneurial Scholarship was established as a tribute to Terry Seelinger and the former Seelinger Foundation. Terry Seelinger was an exceptional business man. He was especially successful in the coal, gas and timber industries. Terry and his wife, Francis, were always charitable within the community. In 2008, Kay Seelinger Duvall ceased operations of the Seelinger Family Foundation; transferring the assets to the Nicholas County Community Foundation, at which time the Seelinger Foundation Entrepreneurial Scholarship was established. In 2014, Mrs. Duvall gifted a home to NCCF. The proceeds from that sale were used to establish



NCCF Grant making Continues to Make a Difference in Nicholas County

Over the past 6 years Nicholas County Community Foundation has awarded over \$500,000 in grants and scholarships throughout Nicholas County to over 50 organizations. Various nonprofits and government organizations have benefited from the long-lasting impact the grant awards have made. To be considered for a grant from the NCCF, an applicant must be a private, not-for-profit organization, as defined by Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, or a public institution. The applicant or the program to be funded must be located in or serve Nicholas County. The 2015 application is available on our website at nccfwv.com.

Applications are due Sep-In 2014, NCCF awarded over \$115,000 to 15 organizations for a variety of projects throughout the county. The majority of the funds awarded are from the Seelinger Family Foundation Fund, with donor advised fund holders contributing to causes or projects. Grant distribution chair Cammie Chapman stated, "Each year we receive more requests for greater funding. The committee always has a very difficult time determining funding. We know we are making a difference in Nicholas County. It is nice to drive through the county and see projects or programs that were impacted from a NCCF grant award."
